 - **Millage:** 4 Mil
 - **Purpose:** EMS

"Each voter determines their desire to support a levy at the ballot box," said Jack Reser, Logan County Auditor. Jack Reser, Logan County Auditor, stated, "The valuation of the property and the millage approved by the voter create the tax bill." Property valuation is mandated by the State of Ohio Department of Taxation under Ohio Revised Code (ORC) 5713.01, which requires the Logan County Auditor to have each parcel physically reviewed and appraised by a State of Ohio-licensed appraiser.
